Prioritizing Public Safety in the San Bruno Community

September 2019

uring the devastating 2010 gas pipeline explosion in San Bruno's Crestmoor neighborhood – which destroyed 38 homes, damaged 70 others, killed eight people, and injured 66 more – the dedication, professionalism, and heroism of the City's first responders were on full display and stood out as a shining example of the strength and resiliency of the San Bruno community.

In the aftermath of the disaster nine years ago, the San Bruno Community Foundation was created, charged with administering the \$70 million restitution settlement from Pacific Gas & Electric Company. The Foundation has put those funds to good work to improve the quality of life for the entire San Bruno community, in honor of those who suffered most directly from the gas pipeline explosion. In recognition of the funds' origins, public safety has been a top priority for the Foundation, and the past year has showcased the Foundation's efforts to support San Bruno's first responders and public safety efforts.

Supplemented by more than \$300,000 in donations from Google.org and employees of Google and YouTube, the Foundation's First Responder Effectiveness Strategic Initiative is supporting four important, community-oriented projects spearheaded by the San Bruno Police and Fire Departments that the City is unable to support through the General Fund (featured on this page). Through the Community Grants Fund, Foundation funding enabled the City's new senior management team to participate in hands-on emergency preparedness training to increase the effectiveness of the City's response in the event of a disaster or other emergency (see page 6). The completion of the Pedestrian Safety Strategic Initiative, again in partnership with YouTube, bolstered the City's efforts to increase the safety of children walking to school and community members strolling through the downtown area (see page 3).

In this Annual Report, we also share the many additional ways in which the Foundation is investing in the San Bruno community. With the Crestmoor Neighborhood Memorial Scholarship, the Community Grants Fund, and an array of other strategic initiatives, the Foundation is fulfilling its mission as a force for positive change in San Bruno.

The Foundation is proud to support these efforts to strengthen community bonds, improve our schools, enhance community amenities, and make San Bruno a safer place for all of us who live, work, and enjoy life here.

First Responder Effectiveness Strategic Initiative

The Foundation's First Responder Effectiveness Strategic Initiative aims to strengthen the ability of San Bruno's police officers, fire personnel, and other first responders to meet the needs of the community, both in their daily interactions with the public and in the event of a serious disaster like the 2010 gas pipeline explosion that led to the Foundation's creation.

Over the past year, the Foundation has funded three core projects that bolster the effectiveness of the Police and Fire Departments with a grant totaling \$160,723:

- Emergency Shelter Supplies: The City purchased the necessary equipment and supplies to operate a standalone emergency shelter. The City is no longer dependent on external entities, such as the San Mateo County Office of Emergency Services or the American Red Cross, in the event of an emergency requiring shelter operations.
- Critical Facilities Site Assessments, Incident Action Plans, and Joint Public Safety Training: This project has significantly enhanced the preparedness of police and fire personnel in dealing with potential disasters and incidents through advance planning and training. With the assistance of experienced consultants, the City conducted thorough site assessments, produced detailed site maps, developed incident action plans, and executed site-specific training exercises for three public facilities: Capuchino High School, Parkside Intermediate School, and San Bruno City Hall. The Police Department put to use many of the techniques and principles practiced in the trainings when responding to a July shooting at the Shops at Tanforan.
- Police Officer Mindfulness, Compassion, and Resiliency Training:
 The entire San Bruno Police Department participated in a unique two-day residential immersion course conducted by the Mindful Badge Initiative. This training equips police officers to perform through occupational trauma with greater capacity for awareness, cognitive performance, and humanity. The department has already reported positive and lasting benefits from the training for police officers' mental and physical health.

In June, the Foundation approved funding of \$303,545 for a fourth project supporting the City's first responders:

• Mobile Command Vehicle: The City is making plans to procure a mobile command vehicle that can be deployed at the scene of a critical incident, natural disaster, or planned large-scale event. When incidents have arisen in the past, the City has had to borrow a command vehicle from neighboring jurisdictions. The City's new mobile command vehicle will serve many purposes, including emergency communications support, a secure area for those managing an incident to meet and develop strategy and plans, much needed power while managing an incident in the field, and an extension of a citywide Emergency Operations Center.

The funding for the mobile command vehicle grant is the result of generous donations from Google.org and employees of Google and YouTube in recognition of the brave work of San Bruno's first responders who supported YouTube during an April 2018 shooting at its San Bruno headquarters.

Investing in Our Community: Key Initiatives

The Foundation has undertaken several major initiatives to strengthen community bonds and enhance the quality of life in San Bruno over the long term. Recent key projects include:



New Recreation and Aquatics Center

With Foundation funding, planning for a new community recreation and aquatics center in San Bruno City Park continues to move forward. Following the San Bruno City Council's approval of the conceptual design for the center in the summer of 2018, the project is currently in the schematic design phase, with the City and Group 4 Architecture, Research + Planning, Inc., developing detailed design plans and building specifications based on the center's program elements, project schedule, and budget.

The Foundation is funding the design and construction of the recreation and aquatics center project through a series of grants covering specific portions of the project costs. The Foundation paid out the first grant – for the conceptual design phase – in late 2018. The second grant covers architectural services through the schematic design, construction documents, and construction phases. The third grant covers project and construction management services for the duration of the project. Totaling just under \$7 million, the three grants are part of the \$50 million the Foundation has earmarked for the project.

Pedestrian Safety Strategic Initiative

As part of the Foundation's Pedestrian Safety Strategic Initiative and in partnership with YouTube and the City of San Bruno, flashing beacons are making it safer for pedestrians to cross five unsignalized or mid-block crosswalks in San Bruno.

In late 2018, the City completed installation of the sets of flashing beacons around town. Four sets are near San Bruno public schools – two near Parkside Intermediate School (featured in photo to the right) and one each near Portola and John Muir Elementary Schools – and a fifth set is located on the southern end of San Mateo Avenue in San Bruno's downtown. Including \$126,000 from YouTube, the Foundation disbursed grant payments totaling \$222,985 to the City for this project.



Community Day in the Park

For the fourth year, the Foundation was the lead sponsor for the City of San Bruno's Community Day in the Park, which was held on Sunday, June 2, 2019, following the San Bruno Lions Club's annual Posy Parade. Community members enjoyed a beautiful spring day in San Bruno City Park with carnival rides, games and crafts, music, food booths, information tables, baseball games, and parade floats. In addition to providing a strategic grant of \$30,000, the Foundation assisted the City in securing event sponsorships from other community partners.

Music Education Strategic Initiative

The Music Education Strategic Initiative has entered its third and final year of funding. Over the past three years, the Foundation has invested \$495,000 in the music education programs at San Bruno's public schools through grants to the San Bruno Education Foundation and the Capuchino High School Alumni Association. The grants have allowed the San Bruno Park School District to provide music programming for all elementary school students and purchase instruments and equipment for the music program at Parkside Intermediate School. The grants have also enabled Capuchino to cover transportation expenses related to off-campus performances and competitions and the purchase of new marching band uniforms.



Led by SBEF Vice President Bryan Vander Lugt, SBEF and CHSAA jointly held the first "Music in the Air" community concert in November 2018 as part of the Initiative's sustainability efforts. Raising more than \$80,000, the concert featured performances by musical groups from Capuchino, Parkside, and the elementary schools, as well as professional opera singer Kevin Thompson (right, with then-Capuchino senior Jonathan Cayaban, who now attends UC San Diego, on piano), who flew in from New York to participate.

School Transformation Strategic Grant

With a \$250,000 grant to the San Bruno Education Foundation, the Foundation supported over the past school year two projects central to the San Bruno Park School District's efforts to transform into "Schools with Tomorrow Inside." The first project – the Sobrato Early Academic Language (SEAL) program at Belle Air and Allen Elementary Schools – provided significant professional development and coaching for kindergarten and first grade teachers to help develop the language and literacy skills of students, particularly English language learners. The grant also supported Parkside Intermediate School's transformation work in collaboration with Partners in School Innovation. The efforts at Parkside have involved working with school leadership and faculty to change the culture of the school, focusing on equity and providing an array of both elective and social elements to the middle school curriculum.

Crestmoor Neighborhood Memorial Scholarship

ounded in 2016, the Crestmoor Neighborhood Memorial Scholarship provides multi-year college scholarship awards to exceptional San Bruno students who have demonstrated a strong commitment to the San Bruno community. The Crestmoor Scholarship honors the community members who most directly endured the destruction of the explosion and resulting fire, especially the eight San Bruno residents who lost their lives. It ensures that the tragedy of September 9, 2010, is not forgotten and that the resiliency, teamwork, leadership, and commitment to community displayed throughout San Bruno in the aftermath of the explosion are honored in the annual recipients of the Scholarship.

In 2019, the Foundation awarded Crestmoor Scholarships totaling \$120,000 to nine outstanding San Bruno students, who were honored at a reception and presentation in June. This year's Crestmoor Scholars include social and political activists, police explorers, youth sports coaches, campus leaders, government interns, and accomplished athletes, artists, and musicians who have dedicated countless hours to helping those in need and improving our community.

Over the past four years, the Foundation has awarded 33 Crestmoor Scholarships totaling \$460,000.



Crestmoor Scholars Excel Inside and Outside the Classroom

Past Crestmoor Scholars continue to give back to the community and impress with their academic and extracurricular achievements. Highlights include:

MICHELLE HUANG: Originally from Jakarta, Indonesia, Michelle Huang has been an active member of the Skyline College and broader San Bruno communities. She served as a business peer tutor in the TRiO program for first-generation students, was elected senator as well as student organization and club liaison for the Associated Students of Skyline College, led the local chapter of Phi Theta Kappa and its community service activities, and was honored with the 2018 Peer Mentorship Award for her service in the Learning Center. For the 2018 Expanding Your Horizons conference, she created a forensic science workshop. This fall Michelle transferred to UCLA, where she intends to study business economics.

VALENTINA CARRENO: As the first female president of Skyline College's Computer Science club, Valentina Carreno has been a trailblazer, substantially growing the club's membership, increasing female participation to 30%, organizing workshops to inspire local low-income youth to pursue interests in science, and hosting the Expanding Your Horizons conference for young women to learn about STEM careers. Valentina has also participated in an ASPIRES science internship, assisted educationally disadvantaged students seeking to excel in math and science at Skyline's MESA Center, and played on the college's soccer team. Valentina spent the summer at MIT in a hands-on research internship prior to enrolling at UC San Diego, where she is pursuing a degree in cognitive science.

J. ENRIQUE MARTINEZ: Spending his early childhood years in San Francisco's Hunters Point and moving to San Bruno at age 10, J. Enrique Martinez has overcome personal and family challenges and is a proud graduate of Skyline College. An alumnus of Capuchino High School, Enrique worked as a student ambassador for AmeriCorps, assisted elderly residents at Marymount Greenhills Retirement Center as a medical technician, and served as a voting precinct inspector during the 2016 general election. Passionate about writing, he published poetry in Skyline's creative writing journal. Enrique is studying chemical engineering at San Jose State University.

NICOLE LIU: Nicole Liu is excited to embark on an undergraduate degree at UC Berkeley. An outstanding student at Capuchino High School and Skyline Middle College who juggled community college courses during her final two years of high school, Nicole has been a leader in many arenas. At Capuchino, she served as secretary for the Interact Club, captained the varsity tennis team, and was an elected officer on the student council. She has been a youth leader at her church and worked as a lead instructor at Mathnasium. Nicole was also active on the Skyline campus, working as a supplemental instruction leader at the Skyline Learning Center and as a student ambassador for the Career Services Center, participating in Model United Nations, and serving in the student Senate.

ZIDANE MILI: A graduate of Capuchino High School, Zidane Mili studies business at Menlo College, with aspirations of continuing to law school. For the past four years, Zidane participated in the San Bruno Police Department's Explorer program, rising to the level of assistant commander and serving as secretary of the Police Explorer Youth Association. He also volunteered as a homework tutor at the San Bruno Public Library, coached a Junior Giants baseball team, and served as youth leader at New North Church. This summer Zidane participated in a mock trial program at Stanford Law School and interned in the district office of Congresswoman Jackie Speier.

JASMIN BEDOLLA: With interests in environmental science and astronomy, Jasmin Bedolla begins her studies at the College of San Mateo this fall. A member of the Capuchino High School class of 2019 and motivated by a desire to serve the community, Jasmin was an active member of Latinos Unidos, organizing efforts to share Latin cultural traditions with the broader community, and of Chance Club, which provides assistance to foster youth. Jasmin also served as a volunteer cabin leader for the San Mateo County Outdoor Education program, where she quided students to develop an interest in nature conservation while improving her leadership and communication skills.

ZARIAN MARTIN: Sports and community service have been common threads throughout Zarian Martin's life. With a strong work ethic, respect for his teammates and opponents, and a competitive spirit, Zarian played basketball for Capuchino High School all four years, while also volunteering as a youth basketball coach and summer camp coordinator at the San Bruno Recreation Center. Zarian also participated in the San Bruno Police Explorer program. Zarian now attends Cañada College and plans to transfer to a four-year university to pursue a degree in sports management, obtain an MBA, and eventually work in the area of professional or college sports.

SHRIYA JAYANTHI: After experiencing the inner workings of local government as an intern for San Mateo County Supervisor David Canepa, Shriya Jayanthi is considering a career in public policy. A scholar in Capuchino High School's International Baccalaureate diploma program, Shriya was an officer in the Interact Club, spearheaded a rally against sexual assault as a leader in the San Mateo Activist Coalition, participated as both an actor and a member of the stage crew in a variety of theater productions, worked as a peer tutor, and served as the San Bruno Chamber of Commerce's first student ambassador. A musician and visual artist, Shriya now attends the University of Southern California.

KATHY LIN: A member of the Capuchino High School class of 2019, Kathy Lin is a freshman at UC Berkeley. Ignited by her participation in the Global Glimpse summer program, Kathy has given back to the community in a variety of ways, most notably as a leader in the Interact Club – both at Capuchino and at the district level – the InspirAsian Club, Students in Action, and the Acts of Random Kindness Club. As a member of Capuchino Leadership, she organized an Oxfam Hunger Banquet, set up a College Pen Pal Mentorship Program, and hosted a Holiday Giveaway aimed to relieve holiday stress and show appreciation for students, staff, and families. She also served on the School Site Council, participated in the Jam Squad, and worked as a tutor and babysitter.

Community Grants Fund

aunched in 2016, the Community Grants Fund invests in the valuable work that community organizations do to enhance the quality of life for all who live, work, attend school, and utilize community, recreational, and commercial resources in San Bruno. Eligible community groups may apply for grant funding of up to \$25,000 for programs that benefit the San Bruno community.

With a \$100,000 contribution from YouTube and Google.org, the Foundation distributed \$300,000 in Community Grants for the 2018-2019 grant cycle. **VouTube** Google.org

2018-2019 Community Grant Awards

In December 2018, the Board of Directors of the San Bruno Community Foundation approved 25 Community Grants totaling \$300,000 to local organizations for programs that benefit the San Bruno community. The grant awards included:

• \$4,000 to the AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN (AAUW) NORTH PENINSULA **CHAPTER** to enable three San Bruno middle school students to attend the Tech Trek science and math summer camp for girls held at Stanford University

- \$10,000 to BAY AREA BIOSCIENCE EDUCATION COMMUNITY to provide San Bruno high school and community college teachers with the technical skills, knowledge, and resources to teach biotechnology curriculum
- \$22,000 to the CAPUCHINO HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION to help Capuchino High School reach its goal of providing digital devices for all students through the purchase of 70 Chromebooks and two Chromebook carts
- \$20,000 to CATHOLIC WORKER HOSPITALITY HOUSE for the continued operation of its emergency homeless shelter located at St. Bruno's Catholic Church in downtown San Bruno
- \$10,000 to the CITY OF SAN BRUNO to support essential emergency management training for its senior leadership team and key public safety representatives
- Stanford University thanks to a grant to \$6,500 to the CITY OF SAN BRUNO to support the Narita, Japan, Sister City Exchange Program, which offers a cultural and educational exchange between San Bruno and Narita middle school students
- \$15,000 to CORA (COMMUNITY OVERCOMING RELATIONSHIP ABUSE) to provide San Bruno families impacted by intimate partner abuse with 24-hour access to crisis intervention services, including crisis counseling, safety planning, and access to emergency shelter
- \$3,000 to the **COUNTY OF SAN MATEO** to support two San Bruno under-served students pursuing higher education through the Al Teglia Jobs for Youth Scholarship Program
- \$20,000 to **EDGEWOOD CENTER FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES** to provide support services to kinship families (where relatives assume parenting responsibilities when children can no longer remain with parents, thereby preventing the need for foster care placement) in San Bruno
- \$15,000 to the LATINO COMMISSION ON ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE SERVICES OF SAN MATEO COUNTY to expand mental and behavioral health services for individuals in substance abuse recovery in San Bruno

Finances and Investments

he Foundation took possession of the \$70 million in restitution funds late in the second quarter of 2016. Based on feedback received during its 2015 Community Listening Campaign, the Foundation Board designated \$15 million of the restitution funds as a quasi-endowment and set aside the balance of the restitution funds to support major strategic initiatives and operations over the next several years. The Foundation also holds funds needed to cover near-term program and operational expenses in operating accounts. Sand Hill Global Advisors, LLC manages the Foundation's investment accounts.

The Foundation's Investment Committee is an advisory body charged with providing guidance to the Board on all aspects of the investment management process. The Investment Committee currently includes Treasurer Tim Ross, President Frank Hedley, and community members Anthony Clifford, Dr. Mark Hayes, and Georganne Perkins. The Investment Committee holds quarterly meetings on the third Wednesday of February, May, August, and November at 4:30 p.m. at San Bruno City Hall, Room 101, 567 El Camino Real.

The Foundation's Audit Committee, comprised of Secretary John McGlothlin and Board Member Pat Bohm, assists the Board in selecting an independent certified public accounting firm to conduct an annual audit of the Foundation's financial statements and oversees the audit process. Novogradac & Company LLP continues to serve as the Foundation's Board-selected auditor. The annual audit is typically presented to the Foundation Board at its regular November meeting, after which it is posted at www.sbcf.org.

SBCF's 2019-2020 operating budget includes direct program expenses of \$1,138,545 and support costs of \$402,640. Cash flow needs for the 2019-2020 fiscal year, which total \$5,118,053, will be funded by transfers from the Quasi-Endowment and the Strategic Pool accounts, as well as interest income from the operating accounts.

As of June 30, 2019, the end of the Foundation's fiscal year, the Foundation's assets were allocated in the three categories as follows:
