# Our Impact in the Community

With generous support from YouTube and Google.org, the San Bruno Community Foundation awarded Community Grants totaling \$300,000 to fund 25 projects benefiting the San Bruno community in 2019.

Here are some of the ways in which our grantees have made a difference in San Bruno:



HELPING RENTERS: With a \$10,000 Community Grant, the HomeSavers Program assisted 69 San Bruno tenant households that had issues with substandard living conditions or were facing eviction.



HELPING SENIORS IN LONG-TERM CARE: Supported by a \$10,000 Community Grant, Ombudsman Services of San Mateo County advocated for 417 residents residing in 56 licensed long-term care facilities in San Bruno. Over the year, the nonprofit made 6,606 visits to San Bruno facilities.



#### **SUPPORTING YOUTH SPORTS:**

More than 750 club and recreational youth soccer players enjoyed well-maintained fields with restrooms and lights at Crestmoor High School and Monte Verde Park as a result of a \$10,000 Community Grant to the Lowen Soccer Club.



STRENGTHENING TIES WITH SAN BRUNO'S SISTER CITY: As part of San Bruno's "sister city" cultural exchange program, ten Parkside Intermediate School students and three adults represented San Bruno in Narita, Japan. A \$6,500 Community Grant to the City of San Bruno also supported San Bruno's springtime hosting of Narita's delegation.



**EMPOWERING GIRLS:** Supported by a \$4,000 Community Grant to the North Peninsula Chapter of the American Association of University Women, three Parkside Intermediate School students spent a week at Stanford University participating in the Tech Trek science and math summer camp.



### DEVELOPING ETHICAL DIGITAL CITIZENS:

Attending Healthy Online Habits Workshops funded by a \$20,000 grant to My Digital TAT2, 169 San Bruno fifth graders learned the importance of making ethical and kind choices in their use of technology. School administrators and teachers also gained an increased understanding of how young people use and perceive technology.



**STEM EDUCATION:** With a \$5,000 Community Grant to the Marine Science Institute, 839 San Bruno elementary school students learned about the San Francisco Bay ecosystem and water conservation through 24 hands-on environmental science education programs.



## AID TO FAMILIES AT RISK OF HOMELESSNESS: A \$15,000

Community Grant enabled SVdP's Peninsula Family Resource Center to provide \$13,050 in rental assistance and \$3,982 in utilities assistance to 20 families (including 24 children) in San Bruno.
