Serving the San Bruno Community Amidst COVID-19

September 2020

Seven years ago, the San Bruno Community Foundation was created in the aftermath of the devastating 2010 gas pipeline explosion in San Bruno's Crestmoor neighborhood, which destroyed 38 homes, damaged 70 others, killed eight people, and injured 66 more. Charged with administering the \$70 million restitution settlement from Pacific Gas & Electric Company, the Foundation has put those funds to work to improve the quality of life for the entire San Bruno community, in honor of those who suffered most directly from the gas pipeline explosion.

As we approached the ten-year anniversary of the explosion, San Bruno – along with the rest of the Bay Area, California, and the world – faced the challenges presented by another emergency – COVID-19. With San Mateo County issuing a shelter-in-place order effective March 17, 2020, the San Bruno community endured business and school closures, prepared for a potentially overburdened health care system, and dealt with fears of a new and deadly virus and the emotional toll of quarantining at home.

During this unprecedented time of need, the Foundation stepped up to help our community. Our Executive Director joined the City of San Bruno's Emergency Operations Center team, coordinating volunteers and assembling resources for nonprofits and small businesses.

The Foundation also awarded a package of COVID-19 relief grants totaling \$500,000 to assist San Bruno schools and small businesses, two key segments of the community struggling to deal with the significant impacts of the pandemic. We want to help our diverse small business community, as the backbone of San Bruno's local economy, recover from the ravages of the coronavirus and thrive once again. Acknowledging the pivotal role of educators always, but especially in times of crisis, we also provided our public school teachers with the digital tools they need to teach our students during these less than ideal circumstances.

San Bruno is the "City with a Heart," and in this Annual Report, we share the many ways in which the Foundation is bringing that adage to life. With the Crestmoor Neighborhood Memorial Scholarship, the Community Grants Fund, and an array of strategic initiatives, the Foundation is fulfilling its mission as a force for positive change in San Bruno. As our community continues to cope with the negative impacts of COVID-19 and embraces the racial awakening taking place across the nation, the Foundation renews its commitment to serving as an important community resource.

As we saw with the response to the gas pipeline explosion ten years ago, the San Bruno community is resilient and strong. We are all in this together.

President's Statement in Solidarity

President Emily Roberts opened the June 3 SBCF Board meeting with the following statement:

"On behalf of the San Bruno Community Foundation, I want to express our outrage over the senseless killing of George Floyd and the many other Black and Brown people whose lives have been taken or harmed by systemic injustice and abuse of power. We stand in solidarity with all People of Color in our local and global community and condemn racism in all its forms.



We acknowledge the platform and privilege we hold as a decision-making body in our diverse community and commit to uplifting the voices and perspectives of those who have historically been silenced and ignored. We remain hopeful that the renewed focus on the persistence of systemic racism will lead to desperately needed progress, and we pledge to find meaningful ways to better support this healing."

Investing in Our Community

COVID-19 Relief Grants

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit San Bruno, the Foundation responded with four major relief initiatives supporting public schools and small businesses:

Teacher Laptop Initiative to Support Distance Learning

The Teacher Laptop Initiative addresses a critical need the San Bruno Park School District uncovered as school sites were closed in response to the shelter-in-place orders implemented in March. The district's teachers were asked to make a difficult and sudden shift in their teaching methods to accommodate distance learning, and while dedicated teachers did their best to adapt to their new circumstance, the lack of uniform and in many cases outdated technology made the situation that much more difficult. A \$240,000 grant from the Foundation funded the purchase of new work laptops to ensure that all teachers in the district have the same, up-to-date computers to utilize the online teaching tools they need to reach their students.

Home Internet Access for Low-Income San Bruno Students

When on-site classes were suspended and all instruction began to be conducted remotely, the first priority of San Bruno's public schools was ensuring that all students had the technology devices and internet access to participate in distance learning. In collaboration with the City of San Bruno, the San Bruno Education Foundation, the San Bruno Rotary Club, the San Bruno Police Association, and YouTube, the Foundation joined efforts to support students' distance learning needs with a \$10,000 grant to the City to provide free internet access, through San Bruno CityNet Services, to the homes of low-income San Bruno students who previously lacked such access.

San Mateo County Strong Small Business Grant Program

To assist San Bruno small businesses as they attempt to survive the disastrous impacts of COVID-19, the Foundation has taken a two-pronged approach. The first prong is to support small businesses in San Bruno through a \$150,000 grant to the San Mateo County Strong Small Business Grant Program. The County Board of Supervisors seeded the program with \$1 million in Measure K funds, and those funds were distributed as grants of up to \$10,000 each to small businesses throughout the County to pay for payroll, operations, ongoing expenses, or other costs associated with COVID-19 impacts. SBCF's funds provided \$10,000 grants to 15 small businesses in San Bruno.

San Bruno Small Business Recovery and Assistance Program

The second prong of SBCF's small business assistance efforts is a \$100,000 grant underwriting the creation of the San Bruno Small Business Recovery and Assistance Program. Administered by the Bay Area Entrepreneur Center (BAEC) of Skyline College with support from the San Bruno Chamber of Commerce, this program is providing valuable financial and technical assistance to a broad pool of San Bruno small businesses to help them apply for aid programs, adjust to the constantly changing rules and regulations governing business reopening during the pandemic, and develop business plans for recovery from the COVID-19 damage they have experienced. Since June, San Bruno businesses have had access to no-cost financial advising, business consulting, tax preparation, translation services, business tools, and virtual workshops. A recovery symposium in October will enable businesses to share best practices and learn from each other's experiences.

Strategic Grants

The Foundation has continued to support two of its most significant initiatives, in collaboration with the City of San Bruno and local public schools:

San Bruno Recreation and Aquatic Center

Funded by a \$50 million commitment from the Foundation, planning for a new community recreation and aquatic center in San Bruno City Park continues to move forward. The City of San Bruno has made significant headway in the planning process in 2020, with the Planning Commission in May certifying the Final Environmental Impact Report and approving the use permit and architectural review permit. Group 4 Architecture, Research + Planning, Inc. is completing the development of construction documents based on the center's program elements and budget, and the City anticipates going out for bid for the general contractor later this year. Groundbreaking on the new facility is expected to take place in early 2021.

Since 2017, the Foundation has approved four grants totaling approximately \$8 million related to the project and expects to approve grants covering the remaining \$42 million of its commitment to the project by mid-2021.



The project includes construction of a new two-story, approximately 49,360-square-foot San Bruno Recreation and Aquatic Center, including a community lounge, lobby, gymnasium, indoor pool, walking track, group exercise room, fitness room, community hall, classrooms, conference room, and City staff offices.

Music Education Strategic Initiative

In May, the SBCF Board approved a fourth year of funding for continued implementation of the Music Education Strategic Initiative. The strategic grants include \$60,000 to the San Bruno Education Foundation (SBEF) and \$8,000 to the Capuchino High School Alumni Association (CHSAA). The SBEF funding supports music education offerings for all elementary school students in the San Bruno Park School District as well as program sustainability efforts. Funding for CHSAA supports the music program at Capuchino High School, including equipment and supplies, transportation, and other program expenses. In the spring of 2017, the Board originally approved strategic grants to SBEF and CHSAA totaling \$495,000 over three years to support implementation of the Music Education Strategic Initiative, with the goal of making music education a hallmark of San Bruno's public schools.

Crestmoor Neighborhood

Founded in 2016, the Crestmoor Neighborhood Memorial Scholarship provides multi-year college scholarship awards to exceptional San Bruno students who have demonstrated a strong commitment to the San Bruno community. The Crestmoor Scholarship honors the community members who most directly endured the destruction of the explosion and resulting fire, especially the eight San Bruno residents who lost their lives. It ensures that the tragedy of September 9, 2010, is not forgotten and that the resiliency, teamwork, leadership, and commitment to community displayed throughout San Bruno in the aftermath of the explosion are honored in the annual recipients of the Scholarship.

Over the past four years, SBCF has awarded 46 Crestmoor Scholarships totaling \$650,000. With a \$70,000 donation from the **Joseph W Welch Jr Foundation**, in 2020 SBCF awarded Crestmoor Scholarships totaling \$190,000 to 13 outstanding San Bruno students. With the COVID-19 pandemic preventing in-person gatherings, SBCF honored the 2020 Crestmoor Scholars at its June Board meeting on Zoom.

JUMANA ABDELGADIR: As president of the Black Student Union, a member of the School Site Council, a peer tutor, track and field team captain, and the only student to serve on the principal's hiring review committee, Jumana Abdelgadir was a leader at Capuchino High School. Her broad community involvement included volunteering at a local hospital and at the San Bruno Library Homework Center. Combining her interest in science and social justice, Jumana plans to study public health at UC Berkeley.

JUN CHAN: Motivated by her mother's medical struggles, Jun Chan plans to pursue a degree in the biological sciences at UCLA. She volunteered at Mills-Peninsula Health Center, took emergency medical responder training, served as an election poll worker, and participated in an Empty Bowls fundraiser for organizations fighting hunger. Jun was also an active member of Interact, the Environmental Club, and the California Scholarship Federation at Capuchino High School.

ISABELLA DA SILVA: Concert master of the Capuchino Chamber Orchestra, music teacher, and theater stage performer, Isabella Da Silva has given back to the community through the arts. She has also been active in her church, singing in the choir and teaching Sunday School. The daughter of Brazilian immigrants, Isabella has overcome many cultural challenges and will be the first in her family to attend college. Isabella begins her studies at UC Santa Cruz this fall.

TRISTAN DAVIS: Headed to Grinnell College to study environmental science, Tristan Davis hopes to address issues of climate change. As president of the San Bruno 4-H Club, he organized community service activities, served as a mentor for younger members, and partnered with the San Bruno Community Services Department. Tristan also served on the San Mateo County Junior Fair Board, was a member of the Capuchino High School track and cross country teams, and played tuba in the school band.

KARINA DIAZ ALVAREZ: Karina Diaz Alvarez is a graduate of Capuchino High School's International Baccalaureate diploma program, dancer, athlete, and theater crew member. For three summers, Karina was a dedicated leader in the San Bruno Library's Summer Reading Program, which sparked her interest in public service and her desire to pursue a career in the mental health field. Karina attends UC Santa Cruz.

PEARL IBEANUSI: As a mother of six, full-time student, campus leader, and cancer survivor, Pearl Ibeanusi epitomizes hard work and sacrifice. At Skyline College, Pearl advocated for solutions addressing student hunger, homelessness, and the needs of international students. As president of the Associated Students at Skyline College, she provided collaborative leadership in her role overseeing all clubs on campus. Pearl now attends UC Santa Cruz and plans to pursue a career in community studies.

NADIA KOSHAFI: An International Baccalaureate diploma graduate and two-sport athlete at Capuchino High School, Nadia Koshafa attends UC Berkeley with the goal of becoming a physician. Motivated by her younger siblings, Nadia was an active volunteer at the San Bruno Library's Homework Center and Summer Reading Program, a peer tutor, and an Interact Club member. She also served as the youth representative on the San Bruno Parks and Recreation Commission.

JAKARTA KUMASI-NAKURU: Having experienced first-hand the struggle of food insecurity, Jakarta Kumasi-Nakuru is motivated to give back to the community around him. At Skyline College, he served as the Food Drive Chair for Second Harvest of Silicon Valley as well as tutored other students. Jakarta also co-founded the Astronomy Club and served as president of Kappa Beta Delta, Skyline's business honor society. Jakarta begins his studies at the UC Berkeley's Haas School of Business this fall.

ALANNAH LINDEN: Alannah Linden proudly represented San Bruno as drum major of the Capuchino High School band. A saxophonist, Alannah also played in the USNSCC Band of the West and was a two-sport athlete. She volunteered with the San Bruno Library's Summer Reading Program, was president of the Environmental Club, and is trained as a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) member. Alannah plans to study atmospheric and oceanic sciences and mathematics at UCLA.

ASIA LOPEZ: Inspired to share her musical talents, Asia Lopez was a leader in the Capuchino Chamber Singers and was elected by her peers to be part of the Chamber Singers Student Council. She was also active in both school and community drama productions as a sound tech and lead crew member. A peer tutor at school, Asia volunteered at the San Bruno Library. Asia attends Los Medanos College with the goal of transferring to a four-year college and continuing her musical aspirations.

KAELYNN MALANI: Kaelynn Malani's identity as a first-generation Tongan and Filipina has inspired her community service. At Capuchino High School, she was president of the Polynesian Club, a peer tutor, and a leader of St. Bruno's Tongan Lataki. At Skyline College, she embraced the Kababayan Learning Community and served as Pacific Islander Club president, student trustee for the San Mateo County Community College District, and commissioner of activities. She now attends San Jose State University.

ERIC TORRES: As a single father of a special needs toddler, Eric Torres is determined to build a solid future for himself and his son. A financial aid ambassador at Skyline College, Eric takes pride in empowering others to reach their educational and financial goals. He was an active member of the Alpha Gamma Sigma, Kappa Beta Delta, and Phi Theta Kappa honor societies. A business major, Eric now attends San Francisco State University and aspires to one day own his own business.

JOMELLINE UMALI: Jomelline Umali co-founded Capuchino High School's Environmental Club, participated in many community events through four years of Interact Club, served as a peer tutor, and volunteered over several summers with the San Bruno Library's Summer Reading Program. With a passion for improving the quality of life for others, Jomelline plans to major in nursing at the College of San Mateo, with the ultimate goal of becoming a dermatologist.

Community Grants Fund

Launched in 2016, the Community Grants Fund invests in the valuable work that community organizations do to enhance the quality of life for all who live, work, attend school, and utilize community, recreational, and commercial resources in San Bruno. Eligible community groups may apply for grant funding of up to \$25,000 for programs that benefit the San Bruno community.

Over the past four years, SBCF has awarded 91 Community Grants totaling \$1,100,000. With a \$100,000 contribution from YouTube and Google.org, the Foundation distributed \$300,000 in Community Grants for the 2019-2020 grant cycle.



2019-2020 Community Grant Awards

In December 2019, SBCF approved 29 Community Grants to local organizations for programs that benefit the San Bruno community. Because the COVID-19 pandemic has made it difficult for some grantees to carry out their funded programs as planned, the Foundation offered grantees flexibility in using the grant funds, including extensions for use of the funds in 2021. The grant awards included:

- \$4,000 to **AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN (AAUW) NORTH PENINSULA CHAPTER** to enable three San Bruno middle school students to attend the Tech Trek science and math summer camp for girls held at Stanford University
- \$10,000 to **BAY AREA BIOSCIENCE EDUCATION COMMUNITY** to provide San Bruno high school and community college teachers with the technical skills, knowledge, and resources to empower them to teach biotechnology curriculum
- \$10,000 to **CAPUCHINO HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION** to support the purchase and installation of smart televisions for instructional use at Capuchino High School
- \$22,000 to **CATHOLIC WORKER HOSPITALITY HOUSE** for the continued operation of its emergency homeless shelter located at St. Bruno's Catholic Church in downtown San Bruno
- \$8,000 to the **CITY OF SAN BRUNO** to support the Narita, Japan, Sister City Exchange Program, which offers a cultural and educational exchange between San Bruno and Narita middle school students
- \$10,000 to **CORA (COMMUNITY OVERCOMING RELATIONSHIP ABUSE)** to provide San Bruno families impacted by intimate partner abuse with 24-hour access to crisis intervention services, including crisis counseling, safety planning, and access to emergency shelter
- \$10,000 to **EDGEWOOD CENTER FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES** to provide support services to kinship families (where relatives assume parenting responsibilities when children can no longer remain with parents, thereby preventing the need for those children to be placed in foster care) in San Bruno
- \$3,000 to **JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT OF NORTHERN CALIFORNIA** to provide workforce readiness training, including in-class curriculum and virtual shadowing with Bay Area employers, to underserved students at Capuchino High School through the Youth Economic Empowerment Program
- \$15,000 to **LATINO COMMISSION ON ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE SERVICES OF SAN MATEO COUNTY** to expand mental and behavioral health services for individuals in substance abuse recovery in San Bruno
- \$10,000 to **LEGAL AID SOCIETY OF SAN MATEO COUNTY** to provide legal assistance to San Bruno residents facing eviction or living in substandard conditions with the goal of keeping them in their homes through the HomeSavers Program
- \$15,000 to **LIFEMOVES** to provide shelter and comprehensive supportive services to homeless families from San Bruno at its Family Crossroads facility
- \$5,000 to **MARINE SCIENCE INSTITUTE** to provide students from low-income San Bruno schools with engaging and interactive marine science instruction through the Discover Our Bay program
- \$15,000 to **MY DIGITAL TAT2** to educate San Bruno Park School District fourth and fifth graders, parents, and teachers on building healthy online habits, behavior, and critical thinking skills
- \$10,000 to **OMBUDSMAN SERVICES OF SAN MATEO COUNTY** to protect the rights of San Bruno residents of long-term care facilities through education, advocacy, and support services
- \$5,000 to **PARENTS HELPING PARENTS** to empower San Bruno parents to effectively advocate for their special needs children and navigate the educational, legal, and social service systems of care
- \$10,000 to **PARTNERS AND ADVOCATES FOR REMARKABLE CHILDREN AND ADULTS (PARCA)** to offer advocacy, family support groups, information and referral, parent education, inclusive recreation opportunities, and community outreach to San Bruno families with developmentally disabled members
- \$10,000 to **PENINSULA CONFLICT RESOLUTION CENTER** to educate youth in San Bruno's Pacific Islander community on diabetes prevention and treatment through the Pacific Islander Health Ambassador Program
- \$20,000 to **PENINSULA VOLUNTEERS** to increase food security and alleviate hunger of older adults and adults with disabilities in San Bruno through proper nutritional support and meal delivery

Finances and Investments

The Foundation took possession of the \$70 million in restitution funds late in the second quarter of 2016. Based on feedback received during its 2015 Community Listening Campaign, the Foundation Board designated \$15 million of the restitution funds as a quasi-endowment and set aside the balance of the restitution funds to support major strategic initiatives and operations over the next several years. The Foundation also holds funds needed to cover near-term program and operational expenses in operating accounts.

SBCF's 2020-2021 operating budget includes direct program expenses of \$42.8 million, including \$42 million for the remaining portions of the San Bruno Recreation and Aquatic Center project, and support costs of just under \$440,000. Cash flow needs for the 2020-2021 fiscal year, which total \$16.5 million, will be funded by transfers from the Quasi-Endowment, Strategic Pool, and Liquidity-RAC accounts, as well as interest income from the operating accounts. SBCF's annual audited financial statements are posted at www.sbcf.org.

As of June 30, 2020, the end of the fiscal year, the Foundation's assets were allocated in the three categories as follows:
